The committee, with an assist from Laura Scanlan Beliveau, spent many hours of work over two years to prepare a full range of centennial events.

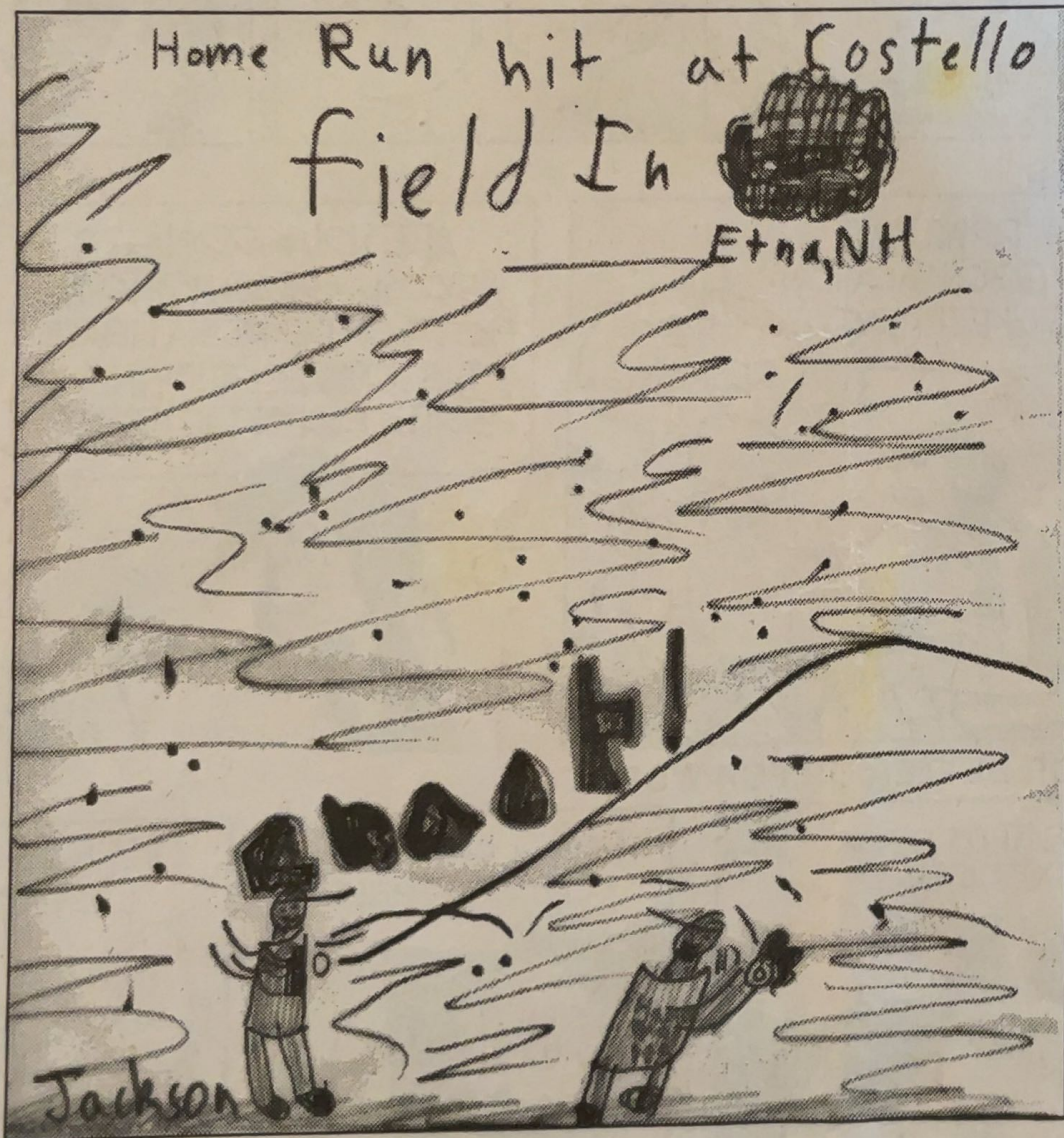
